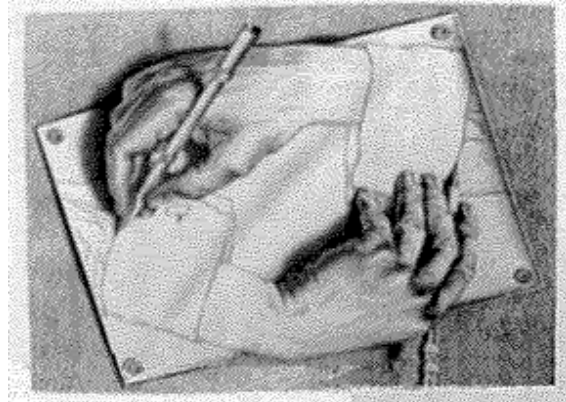

Well Versed ~ 2012: Get Your Entries in Order.

Every year, the Columbia Chapter of the Missouri Writers' Guild publishes the anthology *Well Versed*. It has grown from what poets would call "chapbook" size to a two-hundred page volume.

Every year submissions come from a wider area, giving the judges a greater choice of works to consider. The judges are professionals in the writing field, which puts the contest for publication high on a writer's list to enter.

Well Versed – Literary Works 2010 was named anthology of the year at the Missouri Writers' Guild Conference, an honor of which the chapter is very proud.

The poetry limit has been increased up to 100 lines. Few poets write that much, but if by chance there is an entry that long, it will be accepted.

Well Versed ~ Literary Works 2011

The Columbia Chapter of the Missouri Writers' Guild launched the new edition of the chapter's anthology, *Well Versed — Literary Works 2011*, on Sunday, August .

A goodly crowd of members, family, friends, and the press attended to listen to the writers who had contributed to the volume read their work. Hearing an author read the work gives it more panache.

The Columbia Daily Tribune and The Boonville Daily News represented the press. The Tribune gave us a great write-up. The News put in pictures of two members from Boonville. Both gave CCMWG good publicity.

Submissions are judged by professionals in the writing field. This allows the chapter to launch a professional publication. The judges for the year were:

Poetry: Fred Phister is a retired English Professor, a founding member of the Ozarks Writers League, and editor of *The Ozarks Mountaineer*.

Prose Fiction: Sheila Wood Foard has written award-winning articles, stories and books for children, young adults, and adults. She is a writing instructor for the Institute of Children' Literature.

Prose Nonfiction: Marti Attoun is a contributing editor for *American Profile* magazine and has published hundreds of articles for national magazines including *Ladies' Home Journal*, *Redbook*, and *Good Housekeeping*.

This 2011 edition contains a varied selection of fiction, non-fiction, poetry, and nature photography.

to the new definition:

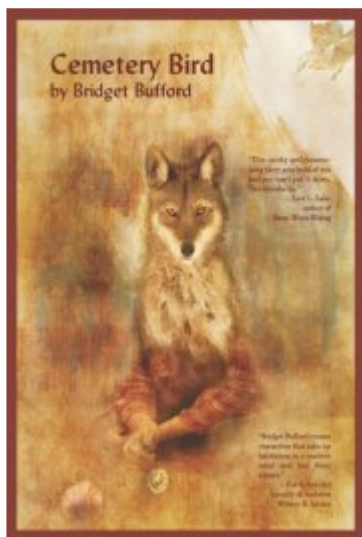

KOPN's Jill Sheets, host of *Penquin Tracks*, interviewed Carolyn Mulford July 12 as part of a series on authors who write for middle grade and young adult readers. Carolyn's credits include a middle grade historical novel (*The Feedsack Dress*), three YA nonfiction books, and educational materials for various levels.

Sheets broadcast the 25-minute interview in July and again in September. She plans to post it on station's website (www.kopn.org/archives).

The interview covered such topics as Carolyn's writing process, the differences in writing fiction and nonfiction, her works in progress for both children and adults, and the best advice on writing she ever received. The advice included:

1. Don't give up (particularly in writing and marketing fiction);
2. Know your readers (particularly in writing nonfiction);
3. Read what you want to write.

Mulford's Notes on Killer-Nashville

Carolyn Mulford found out at Killer Nashville just what can kill a manuscript.

The following is taken from her web site.

"Why Agents and Editors Stop Reading posted on September 1, 2011 by Carolyn

"Submit a perfect manuscript, advised a panel of agents and editors at Killer Nashville, a mystery writers' conference held August 25-28, 2011.

"The turmoil in the publishing world has made it even harder to persuade anyone to represent or publish your book. Agents and editors who find imperfections on the first page often dismiss the whole manuscript.

"What makes them stop reading? Lots of things, according to agents Jill Marr of Sandra Dijkstra and Jeff Kleinman of Folio and editors Deni Dietz of Five Star and Martin Shepard of Permanent Press. A volunteer read aloud eight first pages submitted by conference participants. Each panelist called "Stop" when the reader reached something unacceptable. The reader finished only one full page."

IRS Mileage Rates Change

The Internal Revenue Service has announced that the optional standard mileage rate for business use of a vehicle has increased 45 cents to 55.5 cents per mile for all business miles driven on or after July 1, 2011, up from 51 cents for the first six months of the year. The increased rate used for computing deductible medical or moving expenses is 23.5 cents per mile. The 14 cents-per-mile rate used for providing services to charitable organizations is set by statute and did not change. using these rates, just in case there

are any changes.
